Emanuel is a term that gets used in church a lot during the month of December. We sing songs like "Oh come, oh come Emanuel." We spend time in prayer and reflection, directing our attention to the coming birth of Jesus. We even talk about incarnation, about God coming to bewith us, which is, after all, the meaning of the word Emanuel: "God is with us." But I don't think we always register the implications of that belief. Maybe it's because the idea is rooted in mystery: that God would make our cause God's cause and would come to be with us in the midst of our lives. Whatever it is about this belief, we don't always live like it's true.

For a lot of Christians, everything is about the afterlife: what comes after we die. We spend our lives trying to be good so that we can get to heaven after we die. This creation, is seen as something we need to escape. It is, after all, so full of sin. But that's not really the message of the Gospels. And the idea of the incarnation, of "Emanuel," ought to direct us to a different understanding of what we are living for. After all, the story is not that God has abandoned

creation, but rather, that God has decided to come and be a part of it. As Eugene Peterson puts it in his Message translation: "The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood." (John 1, MSG)

At this time of year, when we are all turning our attention to the coming birth of Jesus, Emanuel, "God is with us," we ought to stop and wonder where our focus is. If God is with us, then why wouldn't we live as though this life, this place, is where we will meet God? And indeed, in scripture we hear testimony again and again about God being present here and now.

It begins with the creation story in Genesis 1, where God hovers about the waters of the earth and breathes life into all that is. In Psalm 24 we read "The earth is the LORD's and all that is in it." In Isaiah 6, the heavenly beings that surround the throne of God chant "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory." Jesus even extends this to humanity itself when he directs us in Matthew 25 to see his image in the face of those who are hungry, naked, and in prison.

This time of year, as we turn our attention to the coming of Christ into our world, let us remember that escaping this life isn't the goal. Instead, we are called to recognize the gift of this life, and to seek the presence of God here and now. Where do you see it? In the beautiful changing of the seasons? In the presence of family and neighbors during this time of holiday festivities? What about in the face of those beckoning us to serve: the hungry, the sick, those in need of housing? Christmas calls us to remember that God has come near. It reminds us of Emanuel: "God is with us."


ADVENT SCHEDULE

diverse musical styles, and engaging accompaniments combine to ensure a rich and meaningful holiday worship experience.


LONGEST NIGHT SERVICE Wednesday, December 21, 7:00 pm in the Chapel

DISCIPLES MISSION FUND CHRISTMAS OFFERING





First Christian Church – Lafayette Executive Board Notes/Minutes

November 10, 2022

The Executive Board of First Christian Church – Lafayette, met Thursday evening, November 10, 2022, in rooms 203/204 of the Education Building at First Christian Church. The meeting was called to order at 6:00pm and a Quorum was established by Cindy Garvey, Parliamentarian. Board Chr. Dave Kelsey offered an opening prayer.

The following persons were in attendance: Dave Kelsey, Steve Henry, Cindy Garvey, Mike and Susie Nelson, Mike Rubesch, Dan Hilgediek, Carolyn Kanehe, Pastor Andrew Guthrie and Norman Long.

The agenda was then focused on the following discussion and related topics:

· Governance & Ministry Update

 Values & Mission – Pastor Guthrie distributed a printed handout for discussion with a focus on the Mission and Vision for First Christian Church – Lafayette. The board members then reviewed and discussed this statement: "We are Disciples of Christ, a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world. As part of the one body of Christ, we welcome all to the Lord's Table as God has welcomed us. It is our vision to be a faithful, growing church that demonstrates true community, deep Christian spirituality and a passion for justice. And it is our mission to be and to share the Good News of Jesus Christ, witnessing, loving and serving from our doorsteps "to the ends of the earth."

 Indiana Landmarks Meeting. (Indiana's largest Historical, not for profit organization devoted to preserving church facilities.) (Funded by Lilly Endowment)

§ The initial introductive meeting was attended by: Steve Henry, Dan Hilgediek, Don Lindstrom, Dave Kelsey, and Pastor Andrew Guthrie.

§ They have more than 30 years of experience and have worked with many many church congregations.

§ There will be four training sessions in Indianapolis during February & March and in May & June 2023.

§ Their program comes with a series of grants at \$8500 & will be doubled in 2023.

§ Competitive additional grants as seed money to begin needed conversion expenses will be available for at least \$25,000 and will be doubled.

§ Each selected church congregation will be entitled to send four leaders and the senior minister to the 2023 training.

§ The purpose will be to provide a vision as to what could be achieved, then tools to undertake the conversion.

§ Training will open ideas and suggest tools for implementing the plan developed by the respective congregation.

§ Only 10 Indiana churches will be invited to participate, to learn and to share stories/ideas.

November 13, 2022, Congregational Lunch and Landmark meeting.
§ Introduction to the Landmark opportunities with Power Point slides and a panel of attendees.

Small group discussions at tables in Fellowship Hall following a noon lunch. S Conversations then to be focused around how these four topics work as values at First Christian Church: Generosity, Compassion, Stewardship, and Tradition. And who are we at First Christian Church and what is important as we plan and go forward?

 Regional Assembly. Pastor Guthrie reported on his experiences attending our Regional Assembly held at Geist Christian Church in Indianapolis. More than three hundred were in attendance. The minister from The Light of the World (Indiana's largest Disciple of Christ Church) spoke before the afternoon session with an inspiring message. There were not any resolutions before the delegates and the normal elections were conducted. Our General Assembly will be held in Louisville, KY next July 29-August 1st.

Committee updates.

• Stewardship & Finance will conduct a congregational meeting following the worship service on November 13, 202,2 to act on the 2023 budget for First Christian Church – Lafayette.

 Property – Dave Kelsey reported the outside wall and down spouting on the sanctuary building along with the plastering and painting have been completed to repair the moisture invasion.

Personnel – Dan Hilgediek reported on a meeting with Michelle
Schluttenhofer to finalize the transition of work responsibilities in her final weeks of employment. June Jenkins will be assuming most of the responsibilities.

• Trustees – Dan Hilgediek reported on a planned meeting in December with representatives from Purdue Federal Credit Union regarding the investments for our church.

• Worship – Carolyn Kanehe reported decorating of the sanctuary for the holidays would begin on November21, 2022 at noon and would continue until about 7:00pm.

Next meeting date: Thursday December 15, 2022, at 6:00pm in rooms 203/204 at First Christian Church – Education Building.

Being no other business to transact at this time, the meeting was closed at 7:50pm with prayer led by Pastor Andrew Guthrie.
